Elevator Pitches

- ☐ Confident: Control the convo
- Interesting: Be unique with your background
- Experienced: Highlight your technical skills/experience
- Double-threat: Highlight your soft skills/experience
- Passion: Briefly explain why you have those skills/experience
- The Hook: Tie everything you said into the company you walked to

Tips:

- Be genuine
- Be flexible (don't memorize)
- Be concise and leave them wanting more

Resume Review (1/4)

- Resumes should be:
 - Professional (not stylish)
 - Formatting needs to be simple, not distracting, uniform
 - □ Spell check!!
 - Clear and concise
 - No more than one page
 - Recruiters should be able to get the important information in a quick glance
 - Relevant
 - Space is limited be selective
 - About YOU!
 - This is not the time to be shy about your accomplishments

Resume Review (2/4)

Format Should be clear and concise Sections Name / contact info Education **Relevant Work Experience** Typically must be a paid experience Projects (optional) - both personal and class projects can go here Coursework (optional) **Activities and Leadership** (high school ok for first semester freshmen **only**) Honors and Awards (optional) Skills

Resume Review (3/4)

- Content
 - Use action words, try to avoid complex tech terms / acronyms unless industry standard
 - Some will be engineers, others will be recruiters; be mindful of who you are talking to (including for your elevator pitch)
 - ☐ Add numbers to quantify wherever possible
 - □ Focus on technical skills as well as "soft skills" such as communication, team work, leadership, etc.
 - □ Personalize your resume to each company you visit (at least the important ones / those in different industries)

- Last tips!
 - You can include your simplified LinkedIn URL especially if you can't fit all your activities / accomplishments!
 - If your LinkedIn needs work / you don't know how to get the simplified URL just reach out!
 - Always print more than you think you'll need when attending in-person events
 - Please don't print dozens of resumes in the office
 - ☐ Embellish, don't lie
 - ☐ Thesaurus.com is your friend
 - □ Submit your resume to the database to earn NSBE Coins!

Career Fair Preparation

- Research in advance the employers registered to attend the fair.
- Make a list of your top 10 companies and learn as much as you can about them
- Know what positions are available
- □ Apply online!!!
- → Have your resume on hand when talking to a recruiter.
 - ☐ Have plenty of copies of your resume ready (15-20) when in-person
- Prepare a **20 to 30 second introduction** to use with employers.
- ☐ Have at least **5 questions prepared** for each recruiter
- ☐ Know the dress code





"The Ford Summer Internship Program provides students with hands-on, career-specific experience through full-time work during summer break (from early-May through the end of August). Students are engaged in networking and educational activities throughout their internship to gain exposure to senior level management and to learn more about Ford, our values and career opportunities."

"Over multiple semesters, Co-Ops are assigned to various areas within the PD and Manufacturing organizations to help define their professional interests, while demonstrating technical ability and leadership skills. Upon graduating, participants who've demonstrated the requisite skills to contribute to the organization's success will be considered for available openings matching their background and interests."

Benefits

Recognition of the large investment on your part toward the company

Solid path to employment (4-7 months of experience)

Time away from rigorous school schedule

More time to work and contribute to your position

A good window into what full time work at that company is like outside of summer (Spring/Fall)







What is the cost of missing school?

Missing school to go on a co-op can be stressful


- Graduation date pushed back
- Scholarships need to be secured
- Other people graduate

Actual financial "loss"

- Less money early in career by starting a career later
- Any early start in saving money/ investing leads to big returns later in life
